

Keeping The Roastery name and the mail order list, we set up a tiny roaster in the basement of the Annunciation convent.


Roasting, mailing, and delivery became the basis of a tiny business.

Meet Alex Plattes, Kenny Tree Inspector

"I am your neighbor! I currently live in the Diamond Lake neighborhood with my wife, eight-month-old son, and dog Penny. I grew up in Southwest Minneapolis on the border of the Kenny and Armatage neighborhoods and attended Kenny elementary and Anthony middle schools. I earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Horticulture from the University of Minnesota and have been a professional arborist for 11 years. It is a very fulfilling career and I am proud to serve the residents of Minneapolis."

Alex is one of 12 tree inspectors who work for the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board's (MPRB) Forestry Department. One of their most critical assignments hearkens back to the large number of elm trees lost to Dutch Elm Disease (DED) in Minneapolis during the 1970s and 1980s. The most successful DED mitigation effort was sanitation to quickly find and condemn already-dead and infected elms, helping slow the spread of DED.

Today, elm trees located on public and private property are inspected and monitored. When DED is confirmed, MPRB tree inspectors mark the trees for removal.

Inspectors do the same for ash trees if they are infested with Emerald Ash Borer; and less frequently, oak trees infected with Oak Wilt. Tree inspectors also monitor trees that residents have elected to treat for the pathogens and pests mentioned above. MPRB forestry operations are limited to planting, pruning and removing trees. They do not treat trees.

Another critical assignment is finding and marking public trees for removal, which includes boulevard and park trees. These trees are either at the end of their lifespan or pose a risk to public safety. After they have been marked for removal, tree inspectors select the replacement tree species that will be planted the following spring.

The replacement tree species is determined by the species diversity level at the neighborhood and city block level. The long-term goal is to have a diverse array of tree species in every neighborhood and every block. Doing so will make our urban forest more resistant to future invasive tree pests and pathogens.

Recycling Tip




Want to shred confidential documents?

Minneapolis Recycling doesn't accept shredded paper anymore because fibers are not long enough to make other products, and the small bits of paper jam sorting machines.

What are my options?

- Shred at home and put in trash.
- Shred at home and bring to a business that has shredding services. They might charge a handling fee in addition to the per-pound fee, but the paper will be recycled. You can also check with office supply stores or package mailing companies to see if they accept shredded paper.
- Shred at home and compost just be careful about the ratio to your green components and avoid shredding glossy or highly colored paper.
- Shred at home and reuse for pet bedding, packing for boxes, scented sachet bags, or make your own recycled paper.
- Bring your unshredded paper to a shredding service; a shredding event; check with your tax service, bank, or credit union to see if they offer services; some communities offer service to the public for a nominal fee.
- Don't shred most paper. Use black permanent markers/products that camouflage data and put in recycling.
 Remember that address data is fairly public.
 Save shredding for paper that has Social Security numbers or credit card/financial accounts or health insurance/medical data.

Who's in the 'Hood

Putting life's puzzle pieces together is often a journey that takes hard work, time, and effort. Sometimes, though, those pieces fall into place perfectly at just the right time. Some things are just meant to be.

Meet **AI and Meg Vesterfelt**, our neighbors on 57th and Colfax. Their lives collided one fateful weekend and were never the same afterward.

They met while Meg was back home in Minnesota visiting family. Meg, who was working as a dermatologist in Dallas, TX, at the time, was thinking of moving back home and had begun looking for work here.

One day, while they were both visiting Minneapolis, she and Al 'linked' on a dating app based on proximity. That link quickly turned into a bond. While she eventually returned to Dallas, and he went back home to Nashville, their online connection turned into love. They forged a long-distance relationship and after Meg moved back to Minnesota, Al also relocated to Minnesota and the sparks continued to fly.

They started their lives together in Minneapolis' North Loop, but eventually realized the vibe in that part of town wasn't something they wanted long term.

"There was too much light pollution through the windows and people revving their motorcycle engines at two in the morning," says Al. "It just was not great."

There are young kids, new couples who don't have kids, older couples, older individuals, and it just feels like a lived-in neighborhood. It feels like this is where people live, and it feels great."

Meg loves the variety of things to see while out and about. "Every day that we take our dogs for a walk. I'm not bored."

She loves looking at updates people make to their yards, the little libraries, and neighbors' gardening skills. "It's just a nice, quiet hubbub, which is perfect for us."

For Al and Meg, their experience with neighbors in Kenny matches their fond feelings of the neighborhood aesthetics. They recall that their first encounter with a neighbor upon moving in, was Jerry bringing over zucchinis to share.

"Our neighbor Matt is great," Al says. "We have a street 'grandma' who takes care of everything. It's been really great."

They moved in October and learned that their block was the 'Halloween block' in the neighborhood. Meeting the challenge, Meg recalls how Al jumped right into the swing of things their first year, smoke machine and all. "It was very heartwarming coming from planned communities in Dallas; there wasn't any social intimacy."

This summer, the Vesterfelts are looking forward to repainting the outside of the house and giving their yard a little love. Meg continues her work here in the Twin Cities as a dermatologist, while Al builds websites and is currently in school studying to become a therapist.

When you see them with their two Shih Tzus, Olive and Linus, walking the neighborhood, be sure and say hello!

A Kenny Pioneer Leaves the Neighborhood

Earlier this year, the Kenny neighborhood marked a significant event when one of its earliest and most influential residents, Bob Engstrom, moved from the Grass Lake Terrace home that he designed and built 63 years ago. A prominent property developer, pioneer in the use of native and prairie plants in landscaping, youth athletics coach, and leader of the Kenny Neighborhood Association, Bob is deeply missed as a vital member of the community.

His neighbor Rick Oknick described Bob's departure as a "changing of the guard," emphasizing Bob's unique and irreplaceable contributions to the neighborhood. "Kenny was a mosaic with Bob as connective tissue. There's not going to be another one like him."

Bob and his late wife Phyllis were married for 68 years and raised three sons in their house on the north side of Grass Lake. You may be familiar with the beautiful perennial gardens on the lake's north shore where, even into his late 80s, Bob was out pulling a hose across the street from his home to keep the plants thriving.

This unassuming gardening nonagenarian is, in fact, a pioneering property developer who created planned communities that focus on land stewardship, open community spaces, and sustainable design. Hailed as a "visionary land-use expert" by the Star Tribune, Bob was a designer in 1965 of the first owner-owned townhome development in the metro area, Windsor Green in New Brighton. The innovative principles that informed Bob's development work back then continue in the current projects of his firm, Robert Engstrom Companies. Notable examples of their work in

prairie conservation include the Wildflower at Lake Elmo and The Fields of St. Croix communities.

Bridget Rau of the Kenny Garden Club points out that the club has taken several field trips to walk in The Fields of St. Croix. "It's a beautiful prairie dotted with houses, instead of the opposite, which is what you see in most suburbs. Sixty percent of the land in the development had to be all natural."

Bob has been a strong supporter of the garden club through the years, and members reciprocate by helping weed the Grass Lake gardens.

"Most of the Kenny Garden Club members have a plant or two from Bob in their gardens, and there are many at our Fixt Rite garden," says Bridget. "Bob propagated his plants at the Fields of St. Croix and has been extremely generous in sharing them with us."

Bob's community involvement extended to local sports as well. He coached youth baseball, hockey, and soccer teams. Kenny resident Grant Hartley, a lifelong Southwest Minneapolis resident, recalls Bob coaching his hockey team around 1975.

"I have a picture of me as a kid with Bob as my coach. I couldn't believe it when I moved to Kenny and realized he lived just down the block from me! But one thing everyone really gives him credit for is starting girls' soccer around here. Bob helped turn Southwest Minneapolis into a real soccer hotbed before it was popular elsewhere."

As Bob remembers, "In about 1970, we put a boys' soccer team together, but there was nobody here to play against, so we had to travel down to Burnsville to find

competition. The next year, the Minneapolis Park Board created a league. In 1972, I was holding a practice at the park for 128 kids. and up walks an 18-year-old kid named Mike Warter who wanted to help out. I helped get soccer off the ground, but Mike is the one who really built it up." Warter went on to become a local girls' soccer coaching legend and champion in Minneapolis, Eagan, and at the University of Minnesota. Bob continued coaching in the Minnesota Youth Soccer Association (MYSA).

This brief newsletter space is far too small to detail all of Bob Engstrom's involvement and accomplishments in the Kenny neighborhood. He has truly been integral to the community's development virtually since its inception. Though he now lives in Bloomington, Bob's influence is inextricably woven into the fabric of Kenny.
