Together Through Grief and Growth: A Year of Strength in Kenny

2025 has been a year that none of us will ever forget. It has tested our hearts and reminded us why community matters so deeply. In the wake of the tragedy at Annunciation, our neighborhood came together in ways that showed the best of who we are: neighbors supporting one another, offering care, and finding hope through connection. We grieve alongside the families and friends who lost so much — especially the Merkel family, our neighbors here in Kenny — and we honor their strength by continuing to build a community rooted in compassion, safety, and unity.

Even as we mourn, we also celebrate the ways our community continues to grow stronger together. From the laughter of kids chasing bubbles and balloons at the Ice Cream Social & Green Fair, to the great conversations shared between neighbors at the New Neighbor & Renter Welcome Gathering, each gathering this year reminded us that connection is our greatest source of healing.

The citywide Minneapolis Arbor Day celebration at Kenny Park brought families together for tree planting, harnessed tree climbing, live music, and food trucks — while the first-ever Kenny PorchFest filled our streets with music, friendship, and gratitude. Each of these moments, large and small, reflected what makes Kenny so special: neighbors showing up, giving their time, and creating joy together even in challenging times.

Events like these are more than just fun — they're a reflection of who we are as a neighborhood. Kenny is a place where people show up for one another. But it's important to remember that this doesn't happen automatically. Every event, initiative, or gathering takes time, creativity, and financial support. 

Letter from the Chair

Kenny neighbors support Annunciation families for the long term



Three months later, the tragedy at Annunciation Church on August 27 is fresh in our memories. Like other major events, many of us still talk about where we were when we heard the news of the shooting that took the lives of two young students, and wounded 30 others attending a back-to-school mass that morning.

Neighbors from Southwest Minneapolis and elsewhere came together to help the victims and their families in any way we could think of.

Almost immediately, there was a memorial with thousands of flowers outside the church. Blue and green ribbons symbolizing the school's colors hugged trees throughout our neighborhoods and the entire city.

Kenny neighbors joined the mourning in every way possible. We brought flowers to the church memorial, delivered meals to the Merkels, volunteered at the city Neighborhood Assistance Center, tied ribbons around trees, worked at the memorial coordinating flowers and yard signs — anything and everything we could think of to express our sorrow and support.

Fletcher Merkel, the eight-year-old who was killed lived in Kenny with his family. The Merkels were featured in our summer 2025 newsletter and came

to our 2024 New Neighbor/Renter Welcome event, so excited to be part of Kenny. Many Kenny families send their children to Annunciation and are directly affected by the tragedy. The sorrow will never go away, but we hope families find comfort in the love and support of neighbors and strangers who care so much.

The Kenny Neighborhood Association has reached out to the Merkels to see what the neighborhood as a whole can do. They like the idea of a bench at Grass Lake honoring Fletcher, so KNA will work with them to make it a reality. KNA Tree Reimbursement

Last call for 2025 submissions! KNA will reimburse residents who participated in and were selected to receive up to three trees through the Minneapolis Tree Lottery. Improving the neighborhood’s tree canopy was voted environmental initiative #1 in 2024 — and we are here to support all of you to do your part. Planting trees will shade your yard, reduce energy bills, and increase property values.



KNA Security and Safety Rebate Program

All residential properties in the Kenny neighborhood, including renters and homeowners, are eligible to apply for a one-time security rebate of \$250. Rebates can be used on home security projects like: Installing lights for exterior doorways of residential properties, purchase and installation of deadbolt locks, the purchase of home security alarm systems and doorbell cameras.

Arts on Bryant: A Living Room Revival of Community and Culture

In the Kenny neighborhood, a quiet but growing movement is bringing professional music and community connection into a local home. It's called *Arts on Bryant*, and it's the creation of Rebecca Leistikow, a classically trained soprano and passionate advocate for the arts.

Rebecca moved to Kenny from upstate New York seven years ago, and the idea for *Arts on Bryant* began as a way to expose her children, now 12 and 6, to more live music.

"There's so much going on in the Twin Cities, but getting out the door with kids is hard," she says. "I figured, if the music is happening in our house, we'll actually see it." That simple logic spurred her to action.

The result is *Arts on Bryant*, a twice-monthly concert series hosted in Rebecca's home. On the first Friday evening and second Sunday morning of each month, neighbors gather to hear professional musicians perform everything from Renaissance lute songs to contemporary acoustic sets. The concerts are free, open to all ages, and intentionally informal.

"I wanted high-level talent, but in a relaxed setting," Rebecca says. "Kids are around, crayons are falling, people are whispering — but the music is still the focus."

The first three concerts showcased the range and richness of the series:

- Sadie Gustafson-Zook brought warm, witty songwriting and a voice reminiscent of Joni Mitchell.
- Thomas Walker, Jr. and Sarah Jackson, a lute and soprano duo, performed elegant tunes from the Renaissance.
- Austin Wahl and Claire Miller delivered an impressive classical guitar and violin set, ranging from delicate to virtuoso.

"Each concert has been so different, but all have created this beautiful, shared experience,"

Rebecca says. She was surprised that audiences love interacting with the musicians, asking questions and learning about the music. "It's chatty, it's warm, and it's unlike anything I experienced

growing up going to classical concerts where you had to sit perfectly still."

Rebecca pays the musicians herself, inspired by the concept of a "gift economy," giving freely from areas of abundance and trusting that it will return in other ways. "Hiring musicians is important to me. They deserve to be paid, and I'm fortunate to be able to support that."

Beyond music, *Arts on Bryant* also offers free yoga classes on Wednesdays and has hosted youth activities like Juggling Club and Classical Music Immersion.

"We had a summer class and were planning a fall series, but I had to pause it for now," she says. "Still, the vision is there — to create inclusive, arts-based experiences for kids and families."

Her home also doubles as a gallery, featuring work from local artists like Cynthia Holien, whose vibrant canvases now fill the stairwell.

"She lives a block away, and I had no idea she was an artist until she reached out," Rebecca says. "Now I walk past these beautiful paintings every day. It's one of the ways this project gives back to me."

So what should you expect if you attend a concert at *Arts on Bryant*? A welcoming atmosphere, professional music, and a chance to connect with neighbors.

"You don't need to bring anything," Rebecca says. "Just come. Bring your kids, bring a friend. There's coffee, juice, sometimes wine, sometimes pastries, and always great music."

If you haven't yet made the walk to 54th and Bryant, consider this your invitation. *Arts on Bryant* is more than a concert series, it's a gift. You can learn






Green Energy Subsidies, Credits and Rebates

The past few years have seen substantial financial subsidies for green energy technologies such as heat pumps, rooftop solar, electric vehicles, or energy-efficient appliances. Much has been reported on the recent federal budget that reduced or eliminated

subsidies or tax credits for these items. However, there are still funds to help defray those costs in the form of loans, low-income funding, and assistance from Xcel Energy and CenterPoint Energy.

The situation for loans for subsidies is very fluid, so we found this great tool, which is updated as funding situations change. The Clean Energy Resource Teams, or CERTs, put this together. CERTs' mission is to connect Minnesota individuals and communities to the resources they need to identify and implement clean energy projects. The tool is at:

www.cleanenergyresourceteams.org/pay-your-projects



Simply identify your project type, confirm if it is for an individual and then click on **Find Programs**. All current funding sources are listed for you. Your contractor is also a good source of information on any rebates or tax credits that may apply.

We know these changes are confusing for everyone, but this tool can help you as you contemplate your next project!

Fall Checklist

- Plant the last of the spring bulbs
- Mow your lawn one last time if needed (and lower blades to 2")
- Wrap sensitive evergreens in burlap
- Put wire fences around bushes/plants that rabbits might damage during winter
- Put tree guards around young trees to avoid sunscald damage
- Leave the leaves! Protect living creatures by leaving seedheads, stems, leaves on the ground. They provide habitat for bees, moths, butterflies, beetles and more.
- Keep storm drains clean of fallen leaves
- Water trees weekly if it has not rained until the ground is frozen
- Clean and disinfect garden tools and containers


WILDFIRE SMOKE



Wildfire smoke contains small particles that are small enough to enter deep into your lungs or heart and even pass into your bloodstream.

- Minnesota Department of Health

Consider gifting an air purifier this holiday season to help with smoke from wildfires. Look for a HEPA or MERV-13+ designation.



You can also recommend an app called EPA AirNow that gives air quality forecasts from the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency.







Buckthorn Ink Recipe (Note: For artistic use only; do not eat or drink)

Ingredients/Equipment:

Container(s) for foraging (reusable take-out containers with a lid are great)

Large old pot (can stain)

2-4 cups (575 g) buckthorn berries

Potato masher

Water

Fine-mesh strainer

Large bowl

Coffee filter

Rubber gloves

Glass container(s) with a tight-fitting lid(s)

Paper, for testing

Gum Arabic

Optional ingredients: 1/4 teaspoon alum (green ink), and/or vinegar (teal/blue ink)

Foraging:

Around late September, Use the iNaturalist app to identify the plant as buckthorn. Since they are considered invasive, no one minds people picking the berries because it takes them out of circulation. You may want to wear gloves — the berries can be squishy and sticky, and there can be very sharp thorns. Only harvest the very dark purple/black berries to get the most intensely colored ink. Collect at 2-4 cups depending on how much ink you need.

Purple Ink:

1. In a the pot, crush the berries with a potato masher.
2. Cover them with water and cook at a simmer until the water takes on a dark purple-blue color. It is okay if some water evaporates — this will intensify the color of the ink.
3. Next, filter the mixture through a fine-mesh strainer with a bowl underneath to collect the liquid. Discard any solids (do NOT put in a compost pile or anywhere the seeds could sprout). A further round of filtering the liquid through a coffee filter should give you a nice smooth ink.

4. You can use this purple ink as is, or you can set aside two ounces and add 10 drops of gum arabic to help create a slightly thick, glossy ink.

Sap Green Ink:

1. Set aside 4 tablespoons of the buckthorn ink. Add about 1/4 teaspoon of alum to the mixture to achieve a green color.

2. Test out the color frequently on paper and adjust the ratio according to your desired result. Note: color can shift dramatically as it dries.

Other Color Experiments To Try:

You can try substituting vinegar for alum to get more of a teal/blue color. Again, test frequently and allow to dry to see true color results.
